
Parents of 3 children

Why do I use Restorative Practice?



It is **simple** - less is more

It is empowering Panyone can use it

It is effective

A simple tool based on a few questions, a safe space to talk, a facilitator and willing-to-be-vulnerable participants



Restorative Practice parallel to FDR

FDR:

Child focused

Moving forward

Restorative Practice:
Reflection on the past
Relationship focused

Clarity about what is what when using both



When to consider Restorative Practice


When in FDR:

Something gets in the way
There is a stand still
Or a merry-go-around of issues
Parents return to FDR regularly
Unresolved conflict

How to apply Restorative Practice

Assess:

What the issue is

How to name it

Are both willing to address the issue

If clear:

Offer a seperate session, not FDR but RP

If suitable:

Book the time, ask the right questions and go



Restorative Practice made simple

What happened?
What was the hardest part?
(or: What were you thinking at the time?)
What is needed?



When to apply and when to refrain

When to apply:

Separation has been a while ago

Returning parents

Unresolved conflict, lack of repair

When to refrain:

When the pain is fresh? Not sure about that on yet

Power imbalance

Current abuse or active trauma
