

## Current services and programs

## State-wide funded services

The Mental Health Commission funds over 60 Alcohol and Other Drug Services across the State, through:

- State-wide network of Community Alcohol and Drug Services;
- Residential treatment services;
- Specialist treatment services; and
- Diversion services.

## Community Alcohol and Drug Services (CADS)

Provide treatment and support for individuals seeking to address their own or another person's AOD use. Target groups for support include:

- Aboriginal people and communities;
- Children and young people;
- People with co-occurring mental health and AOD problems;
- People in rural and remote areas;
- Families/significant others, including AOD using parents;
- People from culturally and linguistically diverse populations; and
- Offenders (including youth).

### Residential Treatment Services

- Generally AOD residential treatment for adults.
- Support is provided to families through outpatient services.
- One metropolitan service provides residential treatment and accommodation for mothers and their young children.

## **Specialist Treatment Services**

Specialist services provided for:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander People.
- Young people (outpatient and residential).
- Home-based withdrawal service.
- Women and their families.
- Offenders (including youth) Diversion.

## WA Diversion Program

- A State-wide suite of programs aiming to divert offenders with AOD related problems into AOD treatment, and break the cycle of offending.
- Offenders include young people and adults apprehended by WA Police and those appearing in courts.
- Programs vary from providing brief early intervention sessions to more intensive, supervised programs.
- Diversion from the criminal justice system can lead to family and/or significant others accessing support.

## Parent and Family Drug Support Line

- Established in 1996 as part of a state-wide strategy to support parents and families by offering a 24 hour telephone counselling referral & information service.
- Operated by professionally qualified counsellors.
- In 2000, the first Parent Peer Volunteers with lived experience were trained and recruited to provide peer support to distressed parent callers.
- A free "Parent and Family Information and Support Pack" for both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal Parents and Families is widely distributed across the state.



## PFDS Parent Support Network

- Telephone support between 8am 9.30pm, 7 days a week.
- Ongoing support through parent follow up calls.
- Face to Face Support for parents attending Perth Drug Court.
- Fortnightly Parent Support Group.
- Participation in Consumer Advisory Groups and Media campaigns/articles providing the voice of the family member.
- Presentations/testimonies to local community groups and forums.
