WAFPN Webinars Bringing perpetrators into view: Developing a web of accountability

WAFPN's popular one day conference is now fully booked. WAFPN and Department for Child Protection and Family Support are partnering to present free webinars with our conference keynote speakers, Elena Campbell and Rodney Vlais.

The Bringing Perpetrators into View conference is based on a report by the RMIT Centre for Innovative Justice titled <u>Opportunities for Early Intervention: Bringing perpetrators</u> of domestic violence into view.

The conference will build on David Mandel's safe and together model and explore how perpetrator accountability can be increased across the service system including family law.

To promote access to the conference the Family Pathways Network and the Department for Child Protection and Family Support have arranged two webinars to broadcast the keynote speakers' presentations. Details for each of the webinars are outlined below.

Meet our speakers: Rodney Vlais

Rodney Vlais is Manager with No To Violence Male Family Violence Prevention Association (ntv.org.au) in Victoria, though originally from WA. He is a



psychologist and specialist policy worker, advocate and trainer concerning family & domestic violence perpetrator interventions and accountability systems. Rodney is on the Board of the Luke Batty Foundation and was an expert witness at Luke's Coronial Inquest. He has a long history of participation in social and environmental justice struggles, and locates his activism to end men's violence against women within an intersectional feminist approach.

Mastery or Misery: Conflict Between Separated Parents a Psychological Burden for Children

This qualitative research examined parenting, parental conflict, and parent-child relationships following separation in the context of Australian government reform in 2006 and subsequent changes to the Family Law Act (1975). Participants were English-speaking men and women, age 16 to 27 years. The research was guided by attachment theory and social conflict theory, and embedded in grounded theory. The **Cooperative Competitive Parental** Conflict model emerged from the data. Two factors moderated the parent-child relationship: emotional security and responsive parenting. The research found it was not parental conflict, but how parental conflict was handled, that created the psychological burden for a child.

Contrasting Complex with Highly Complex Contact Disputes Between Parents

This article discusses the complexity of seeking a solution to problems associated at times with parental alienation. Two scenarios are presented. Both cases involve a child who does not wish to have contact with an absent parent after the separation of the parents due to implacable hostility between them. In the first case, the child had a good relationship with the now absent parent. In the second case the child never had a close relationship with the absent parent. Each case needs to be assessed on its own merits. Conclusions are drawn and recommendations are made as to how to deal with such issues.

Independent Member for Indi, Cathy McGowan AO, has called on the Government to protect vulnerable witnesses in Family Court trials by amending the Family Law Act to provide specific protections for victims of family and domestic violence so that their abusers would be prevented from directly crossexamining them when they are unrepresented.

Karen McNamara (Member for Dobell); Sharon Claydon (Member for Newcastle); and Graham Perrett (Member for Moreton) also joined Ms McGowan in speaking to the Private Members Motion calling on the Government to amend the Family Law Act.
